
Contributing to CABI's MTS Goals

### An example: Baringo County, Kenya


- Delineate management areas for Prosopis and identify management objectives, depending on:
  - level of invasion
  - habitat suitability
  - land use type
- Prosopis management plans developed and implementation started on ~ 70,000km², with ~1.25 million inhabitants, covering 3 counties
- Aligned with other planning activities at the County level


#### Landscapes Initiative Pooled Fund

- Enhance coordination and avoid duplication


